- Cox Farms - Centerville, VA - Go out for their Fall Festival and enjoy music, animals, food and lots of Autumn and Halloween events for the kids.
- Butler's Orchard - Germantown, MD - You will find both apples and pumpkins at the Butler Family Farm. They have been growing fruits and vegetables for over 60 years
- Homestead Farm - Poolesville, MD - Enjoy a hayride before your apple and pumpkin picking
- Stribling Orchard - Markham, VA - Stribling has 30 acres of apple trees and a bakery too!
- Hartland Orchard - Markham, VA - Add a corn maze to your apple and pumpkin picking!
- Jumbo's Pumpkin Patch - Middletown, MD - The Fairy Tale Trails Corn maze is a must see.
- Belvedere Plantation - Fredericksburg, VA - Check out pumpkins and gourds in every size, shape and color.
- Hollin Farms - Delaplane, VA - This farm is located near Sky Meadows State Park, another great Virginia Park
- Carter Mountain Orchard - Charlottesville, VA - This one is a trek (over two hours from DC). But taken the fall colors and enjoy a side trip to Monticello. (PS, they have apple cider donuts!)



# *Protocol Points to Ponder*

The AESC Cocktail Party is right around the corner with the holiday season quickly following. What are current military recommendations for hostess gifts and thank you notes concerning small and large functions? A bit of research follows:

## **ARMY PAMPHLET 600-60, 11 DEC 2001**

### Thank you notes

- (1) A thoughtful guest will always write a thank you note to the host/hostess who has entertained him or her. It is also thoughtful to send flowers or a gift for very special occasions.
- (2) It is generally not necessary to write a thank you note for large official functions, such as a reception to which hundreds of guests have been invited.

## **MILITARY.COM**

Jane Jollota, cadet hostess at the U.S. Military Academy

Hostess Gifts: Never arrive empty-handed. A small, thoughtful expression of your appreciation for the invitation is always appropriate. Jollota suggests a box of chocolates, a bottle of wine or flowers. My recent favorite is a bag of Starbucks coffee.

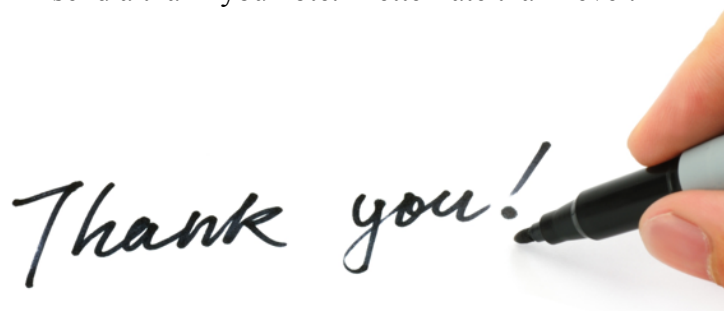
Thank You Notes: Follow an invitation to someone's home with a thank-you note sent within 48 hours of the event. "Always, always," Jollota says.

## **STATE DEPARTMENT July 2013**

Thank You Notes: Without exception, thank your host before you leave. You should thank your hosts in writing within 3-4 days or by phone the next day unless the event was a very informal event or a very large reception. Thank you notes are hand-written and signed without courtesy titles (i.e., Mark Roberts, not Mr. Roberts).

## **MARINE CORPS UNIVERSITY**

Thank You Notes: Hand written thank you notes are ALWAYS appropriate and express your appreciation for a thoughtful action, expression or gift. The thank you note should match the dignity of the occasion. An email thank you note may be appropriate if the invitation was extended by email. Formal receptions do not require a thank you note or call. Traditionally, the thank you note is sent to the hostess with the host mentioned in the body of the note. The note should be addressed to the hostess using her full, married name (Mrs. John Smith.) Thank you notes should be sent within two to three days. Try to get into the habit of writing a thank you note immediately so your experience is fresh in your mind. If more than a couple of days have passed STILL send a thank you note. Better late than never.



# *Protocol Points to Ponder* continued...

## **NAVAL SERVICE FAMILY LINE July 2006**

Hostess/Host Gifts: When a dinner invitation is offered, a small gift is usually presented to the hostess/host. Examples of appropriate gifts include: flowers, candy, a bottle of wine, or some homemade baked goods (cookies, muffins, etc.) for the hosts to enjoy the next day.

Thank You Notes: When the event is over, find your host and hostess and convey your thanks. If there are many people surrounding them and you must leave, it is acceptable to forego this. Even though it is generally not necessary to write a thank-you note for large official functions such as a reception, it is always a thoughtful and appreciated gesture. A thank you note should be sent immediately. The host/hostess will feel his/her efforts were really appreciated by your prompt response.

It seems all the services agree that large functions are about 100 people or more so Thank You Notes are always appropriate for most of our Engineer functions. Find a card, address and stamp the envelope and leave it on your kitchen counter before leaving for the function. As soon as you arrive home, kick off your shoes, stand at the counter and write the note .... THEN... head to your bedroom to change. Done!

A thank you note is easy, but should you bring a hostess gift for an event of 50 people or so? Our military guidance lets your personal preference prevails. Do keep in mind, however, that the host and hostesses are opening their home for this special event and want everything to be just perfect for you! Most likely, they will have hours of preparation and set-up followed by a late night of getting everything back to normal. How could a hostess gift be inappropriate?

What type of item should you bring? Wine is always appreciated, but there are numerous other ideas that may cost a bit less. Most of these can be purchased for less than \$5 and all for less than \$10. These don't have to be wrapped in fancy paper, just use tissue paper or tie a on a pretty ribbon. Either way, be sure you tuck a tag with your name inside so they know who it is from.

It's fun to entertain - let's head to the kitchen; A pretty jar of a gourmet salt, flavored sugar, or herbs can go right into the pantry. Specialty jams, olive oils, vinagers or nuts can all be used for the next party or enjoyed at home. How about your favorite bread or muffin mix?

Drink options; A small bag of fancy coffee or box of tea is very appropriate. A couple packages of pretty or fun cocktail napkins will always be appreciated. How about cute wine charms?

Powder room pretty; Hostesses frequently use unique specialty soaps, paper hand towels and small candles when entertaining. These items are perfect hostess gifts.

Always appreciated; A box of blank note cards or a little potted plant (only if they love gardening). And those small boxes of four chocolates are the perfect size for a host and hostess to share at the end of a wonderful evening!

soldier*

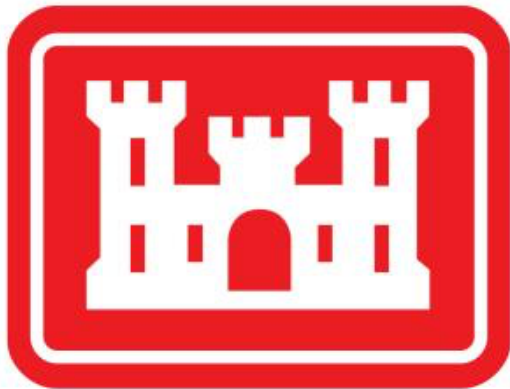
*The warrior spirit has been my

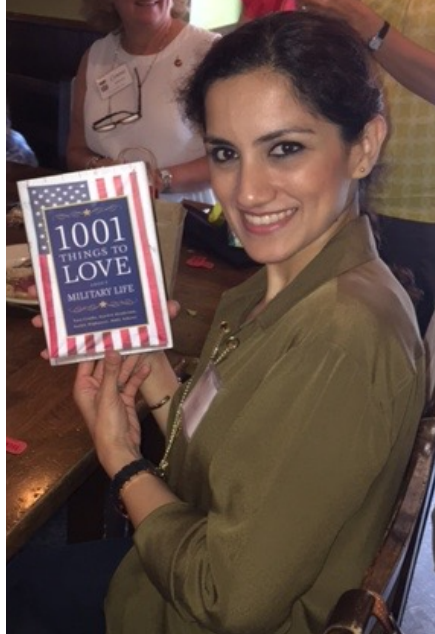

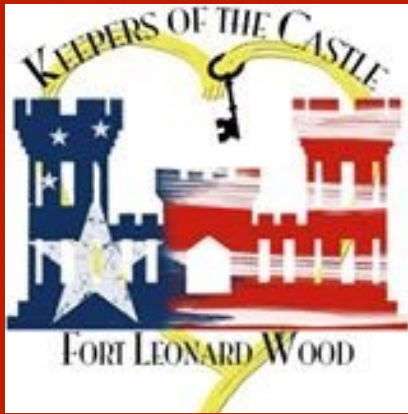

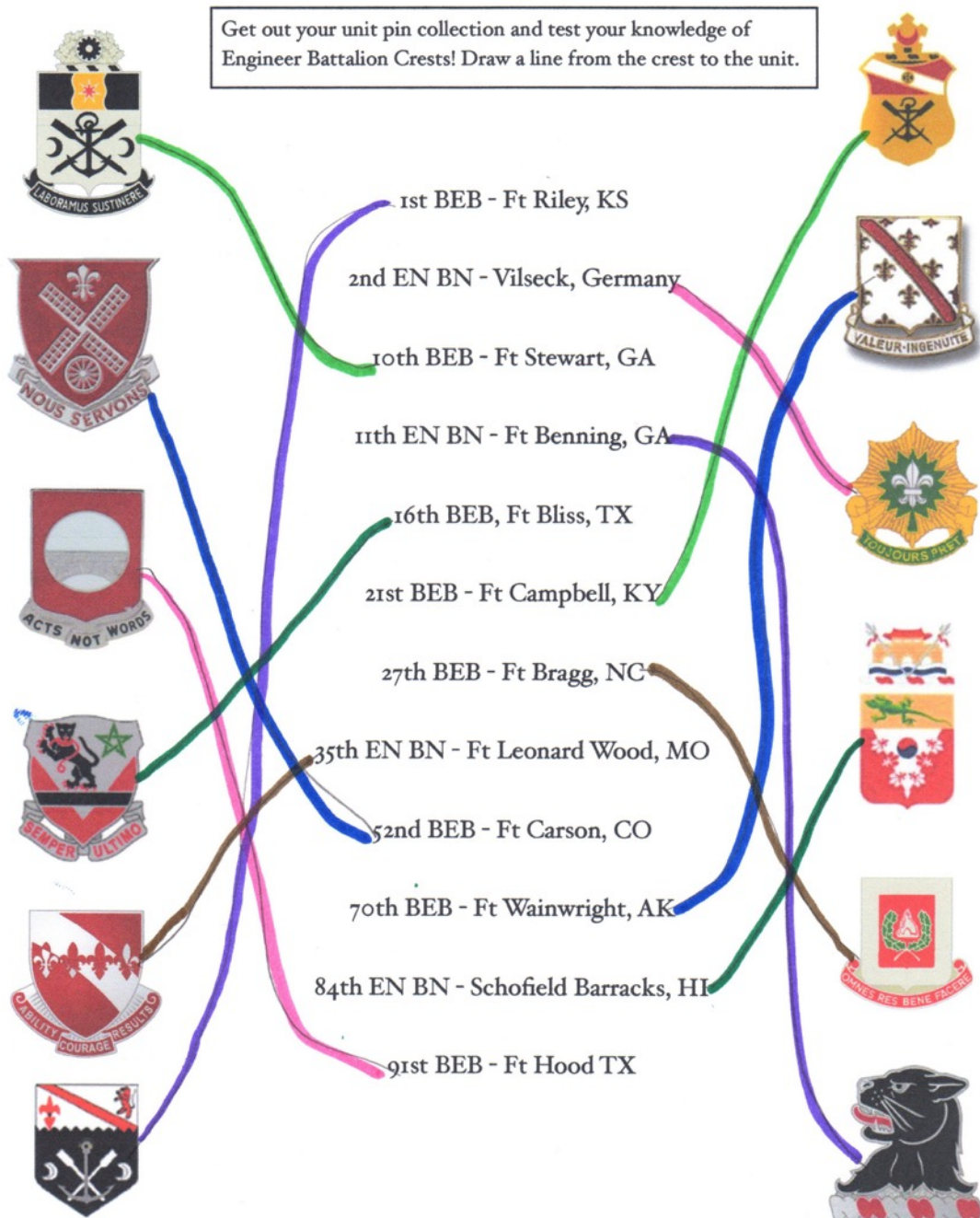
