
Army Engineers and Fort Lesley J. McNair

Home of the Engineer School for 19 years, Fort McNair has been a continually -operated Army post for over 200 years, making it the third-oldest Army post in the Nation. Major Pierre C. Le Enfant included the reservation on his original 1791 plans for Washington, D.C. on what was then called Greenleaf Point. Referred to as Washington Arsenal, the first defenses for the new capital city were built in 1794 near the southernmost point.

Much of the arsenal was destroyed during the British invasion of 1814 but was rebuilt after the war. In 1826, the area near the present-day tennis courts became the first federal penitentiary. The Lincoln conspirators were the most infamous inmates of the prison and the site where four of them were hanged after being convicted of participating in the assassination.

Renamed Washington Barracks, it became the home of the Engineer School in 1901 when the school moved from Willets Point, New York. Then Engineer Captain John S. Sewell supervised the construction of barracks, quarters, and training facilities from 1903-1907.

Quarters 1 – 15, completed in 1905, were built for the Majors, Captains and Lieutenants who were instructors at the school. Due to poor soil conditions down the peninsula, Sewell turned to unproven methods to support the buildings along "General's Row." He experimented with reinforced concrete pilings and worked out the best method after weeks of trial and error. He then built the homes atop them and won the 1906 American Society of Civil Engineers' Norman Medal for his innovative work.

Sewell also oversaw the construction of the War College building, also known as Roosevelt Hall. President Theodore Roosevelt and Secretary of War Elihu Root envisioned the site as the General Staff School for senior Army officers, which it served until 1946. Since then it has housed the National War College for all military branches, the CIA, and the State Department.

The Engineer School remained at Washington Barracks until WWI when it closed due to the demand for Engineer officers in Europe. After the war, the school moved to what is now Fort Belvoir.

In 1948 the post was renamed for Lieutenant General Lesley J. McNair, Commandant of the Staff College (1939-1940) and later Commanding General, Army Ground Forces during WWII. He was killed on July 25, 1944 near Saint-Lo by an errant friendly bomb.





In addition to the Engineer School, the War College, and General's Row, Army Engineers have had a significant impact on the areas adjacent to Fort McNair. Directly across from General's Row, the Washington Channel is maintained by Baltimore District. The Channel itself was conceived by Army Engineers, who designed and built the Tidal Basin and East Potomac Park (directly across the Channel from Fort McNair) to keep the Channel free of sediment. Hains Point is named for Major General Peter C. Hains, who designed and oversaw construction of the tidal basin and East Potomac Park.

In the late 1930s, Washington District Engineer Colonel Robert S. Thomas was responsible for dredging 20 million cubic yards of fill from the Potomac for National Airport. 500 of the 729 acres were landfill. The Corps was also responsible for paving the runways and building the hangers.



Summer Vegetable Tian (found on Facebook)

Ingredients

- •1 Tbsp olive oil
- •1 medium yellow onion
- •1 tsp minced garlic
- •1 medium zucchini
- •1 medium yellow squash
- •1 medium potato
- •1 medium tomato
- •1 tsp dried thyme
- •to taste salt & pepper
- •1 cup shredded Italian cheese

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees. Finely dice the onion and mince the garlic. Saute both in a skillet with olive oil until softened (about five minutes).
- 2. While the onion and garlic are sauteing, thinly slice the rest of the vegetables.
- 3.Spray the inside of an 8×8 square or round baking dish with non-stick spray. Spread the softened onion and garlic in the bottom of the dish. Place the thinly sliced vegetables in the baking dish vertically, in an alternating pattern. Sprinkle generously with salt, pepper, and thyme.
- 4. Cover the dish with foil and bake for 30 minutes. Remove the foil, top with cheese and bake for another 15-20 minutes or until the cheese is golden brown.

MEMBER CELEBRATIONS



LTG Elvin R. Heiberg III, USA (retired)
46th Chief of Engineers
1984—1988

LTG Elvin R. (Vald) Heiberg III, 46th Chief of Engineers passed away shortly before noon on Friday, September 27, 2013. He had recently been diagnosed with an aggressive form of cancer and had been moved to hospice care.

Elvin R. Heiberg III was born on March 2, 1932 at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii. He became a third-generation West Pointer when he graduated fifth in the United States Military Academy class of 1953. He later obtained three master's degrees; the first a Master of Science in civil engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, then two Master of Arts degrees from George Washington University, one in government and one in administration. He also received a degree from the Industrial College of the Armed Forces. Early in his military career Heiberg served as Operations Officer of the 3d Brigade, 3d Infantry Division, in Germany, and taught in the Social Sciences Department at the Military Academy. In 1968-69 he commanded the divisional 4th Engineer Battalion in Vietnam and was awarded a Silver Star. He then served as Special Assistant and Executive Assistant to the Director, Office of Emergency Preparedness, under the Executive Office of the President.

Heiberg served for a year as Executive to Secretary of the Army Howard Callaway. He then headed the United States Army Corps of Engineers' New Orleans District and in 1975-78 the Ohio River Division. He served as senior engineer on the staff of U.S. Army, Europe, in 1978-79. Heiberg was the USACE Director of Civil Works in 1979-82 and then Deputy Chief of Engineers. After managing the Army's Ballistic Missile Defense Program for a year, he became Chief of Engineers in 1984. Heiberg, the 46th Chief of Engineers, remains the youngest "Chief" of the Corps of Engineers since 1838, when Brig. Gen. Totten became the 11th "Chief Engineer" (then the title).

Heiberg retired as a Lieutenant General in June 1988.

As a civilian, Heiberg was chief executive officer of Rollins Field Services, Inc., under the Delaware firm Rollins Environmental Services, 1988-1990. He then moved to J.A. Jones Construction, a major engineering firm headquartered in Charlotte, NC. He headed J.A. Jones Construction Services from 1990–1993 and, in 1992 started J.A. Jones Environmental Services.

In 1993, Heiberg moved back to the Washington DC area and founded Heiberg Associates, Inc., which provides engineering and environmental consulting services to a variety of clients. LTG Heiberg worked as a senior advisor for Dawson and Associates until his death.

Heiberg was elected to the National Academy of Engineering in 1995, and later became a founding member of the National Academy of Construction. We join all of the Engineer family, for whom Vald meant so very much, in keeping Kitty and the entire Heiberg family in our thoughts and prayers during this very difficult time.

As we go to press, funeral arrangements are pending. We will be sending more information by email.
