Three years after the Civil War ended, on May 5, 1868, the head of an organization of Union veterans — the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) — established Decoration Day as a time for the nation to decorate the graves of the war dead with flowers. Maj. Gen. John A. Logan declared that Decoration Day should be observed on May 30. It is believed that date was chosen because

flowers would be in bloom all over the country.

The first large observance was held that year at Arlington National Cemetery, across the Potomac River from Washington, D.C. The ceremonies centered around the mourning-draped veranda of the Arlington mansion, once the home of Gen. Robert E. Lee. Various Washington officials, including Gen. and Mrs. Ulysses S. Grant, presided over the ceremonies. After speeches, children from the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphan Home and members of the GAR made their way through the cemetery, strewing flowers on both Union and Confederate graves, reciting prayers and singing hymns. 2015 Army Engineer Memorial Awards

On Sunday, May 3, 2015, the AESC enjoyed an Army Engineer Memorial Award Luncheon at the Fairfax at Belvoir Woods. We were pleased to have LTG Thomas Bostick as our guest speaker. During the luncheon, the Memorial Award recipients were named. This year, three of our top awards were given in memory of CSM Micheal (Mike) L. Buxbaum, Kristine (Kris) Joy Watson, and Betty Swygert. CSM Micheal (Mike) L. Buxbaum

CSM Micheal (Mike) L. Buxbaum served his country with distinction for 33 years. Achieving the rank of Command Sergeant Major, CSM Buxbaum was stationed throughout the United States and overseas during his career. CSM Buxbaum retired in June 2012, as the 10th Command Sergeant Major of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Most recently, he was employed a defense services company supporting U. S. Forces worldwide. He died of natural causes, while in Afghanistan, where he was working as a contractor supporting the fight and the needs of deployed Soldiers.

CSM Buxbaum was born Dec. 31, 1959 in Manitowoc, WI. He spent his childhood and formative years in Wisconsin. He entered

the Army in September 1978 under the buddy system with his best friend, serving as a U.S. Army Combat Engineer. In 1982, Mike married the love of his life, Roberta Reiter Buxbaum (Bobby). Bobby was his true "battle buddy", a tireless advocate for Soldiers and families, wherever the job took them. She was instrumental in helping the Army Engineer Spouses' Club transition from an officer spouse's club to an all-inclusive Army Engineer Spouses Club with spouses from all ranks as well as spouses of civilians who work for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Our entire Army Engineer family!

Mike and Bobby shared a long and happy marriage. Together, and with great joy, they raised two wonderful daughters, Katie and Christina, of whom Mike was an incredibly proud father. The Buxbaum girls were a stalwart Army family who steadfastly supported the career of this great American Soldier. Mike is also survived by his parents, sisters, brothers-in-law in Wisconsin; a sister-in-law in California; a brother-in-law in Indiana; many nieces and nephews; his loyal pet cat, Breacher; and all of his Army friends and family.

All who had the privilege to know and work with CSM Buxbaum knew him as a passionate advocate for the Army, his Soldiers, and Corps of Engineers civilians, a legacy that will live on in the people he touched and mentored throughout his life. With ultimate honors, CSM Buxbaum was interred at Arlington National Cemetery.



Kristine (Kris) Joy Watson

Kristine (Kris) Joy Watson was a true Red, White, and Blue Army wife. Kris met her West Point Cadet husband in 1982, being introduced by Bryan's roommate. The meeting was just a beginning of a long love affair with a Soldier and his job. The Watsons married in 1984 and began their nomadic lifestyle in Germany. There she got her first real taste of the Army, the caring embrace of an Army Family, the camaraderie of Army "sisters" and the adventure of moving and shopping on new frontiers. Her Army family grew quickly over the years, as did her reputation as an Army Spouse, a community volunteer, a leader among wives, and a staunch advocate of Army Families. She also became renowned for the way she could light up the dullest Hail and Farewell or Spouse's Coffee.

Her talents were endless, her efforts tireless. Kris taught Army Family Team Building to spouses, was a leader in Girl Scouts for nine years, was a Family Readiness Group leader from Com-

pany through Division, facilitated Army Family Advocacy Program seminars, and was a member or Chair of many spouse organizations, to include Army Engineer Spouses Club (formerly Army Engineer Officer Wives Club). Her bright smile, quick wit, full belly laugh, and caring leadership reverberated throughout the Engineer Regiment. Tons of Army wives – and those of other services – were coached, mentored, and loved by Kris and today many of those 'pay it forward' to by her example.

Kris's love for military families and her servant legacy lives on with donations in her memory to Fisher House Foundation, Inc., which provides free housing for families while visiting wounded Service Men and Women. She is interred at Arlington National Cemetery.

Betty Swygert

Betty Swygert began her over 50-year association with service in the Army Engineer Officer Wives Club and continued, as the club became the Army Engineer Spouses Club. She served in numerous board positions, including President, Vice President of the AEOWC. She served most recently as Knollwood Liaison keeping the AESC and Engineer families living there connected. Her warm, sage advice, her years of experience serving with AEOWC/AESC, and her most timely sense of humor earned her the friendship and respect of all with whom she served. She offered unwavering support to the Board members and the general membership of the wives/spouses club. Betty, herself, was an energetic board member until her recent illness. She and her husband, COL (R) Don, were social stalwarts at every club function.

Betty was born in Statesboro, GA, grew up in Chicago, IL and Savannah, GA. She went to Wesleyan College in Macon, GA receiving a bachelor's degree in Fine Arts. She began her career as a teacher at Savannah High School. While a teacher there, Betty met then First Lieutenant Donald R. Swygert, a U. S. Army Corps of Engineers officer who was stationed with the Corps' Savannah District. She would soon agree to become a camp follower with marriage to that young Lieutenant. Betty was a loving and caring mother who successfully nurtured her four children to adulthood, sometimes in the prolonged absence of their father who was on an unaccompanied military assignment or away at war. In addition to raising her children in a difficult military lifestyle, other personal accomplishments include deliberately sharing her love of nature and locations with her children and her artistic ability to translate the beauty living around her into oil and watercolor works of art.

Betty and Don's happy marriage endured for almost 59 years, being terminated by Betty's death after a long illness. Betty, Army Engineer Spouses Club member, wife, mother, grandmother, great-grandmother, aunt, great- aunt, and friend is interred at the West Point Cemetery at West Point, New York.

THE HISTORY OF MEMORIAL DAY

The History of Memorial Day (Continued from page 1)

By the end of the 19th century, Memorial Day ceremonies were being held on May 30 throughout the nation. State legislatures passed proclamations designating the day, and the Army and Navy adopted regulations for proper observance at their facilities.

It was not until after World War I, however, that the day was expanded to honor those who have died in all American wars. In 1971, Memorial Day was declared a national holiday by an act of Congress, though it is still often called Decoration Day. It was then also placed on the last Monday in May, as were some other federal holidays.

Gen. Logan's order for his posts to decorate graves in 1868 "with the choicest flowers of springtime" urged: "We should guard their graves with sacred vigilance. … Let pleasant paths invite the coming and going of reverent visitors and fond mourners. Let no neglect, no ravages of time, testify to the present or to the coming generations that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided republic."

The crowd attending the first Memorial Day ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery was approximately the same size as those that attend today's observance, about 5,000 people. Then, as now, small American flags were placed on each grave – a tradition followed at many national cemeteries today. In recent years, the custom has grown in many families to decorate the graves of all departed loved ones.

The origins of special services to honor those who die in war can be found in antiquity. The Athenian leader Pericles offered a tribute to the fallen heroes of the Peloponnesian War over 24 centuries ago that could be applied today to the 1.1 million Americans who have died in the nation's wars: "Not only are they commemorated by columns and inscriptions, but there dwells also an unwritten memorial of them, graven not on stone but in the hearts of men."

Donna was also passionate about physical fitness and proper nutrition, founding KOPIK (Keep off Pounds in Korea) to assist those assigned to Korea keep fit. She became an accomplished Zumba instructor and loved to dance whenever the music hit her (which happened quite often).

Her most important passion however was her sons and especially her grandchildren.

They were the light of her life and she loved them all dearly.

She is preceded in death by her father and mother, Donald and Arlene Manning and is survived by her husband Bob, son Bobby, son Zebulon and his wife Joanna, son Josiah, her grandchildren Jacob, Cadence and Temperance, and her brother Ronald Manning. 
