

The Relationship between the Corps of Engineers and College Football = Part 3

One of the players who Neyland coached when he was an assistant at West Point was Garrison H. Davidson, an end in the class of 1927. Gar Davidson scored the first Army touchdown in the newlydedicated Michie Stadium during the 1924 season. Upon graduation he intended to go into the infantry, but his coach, Biff Jones, suggested engineers. From 1927 to 1929 Davidson was in the 1st Engineer Regiment, Fort DuPont, Delaware, and served as an assistant coach to the Army football team. From 1930 to 1932 he was in the Physics Department and continued as an assistant coach. West Point hired him as head coach in 1933. He was a 1st Lieutenant of Engineers. His first team was undefeated until the last two minutes of the last game when Notre Dame blocked a kick and won 13 to 12. Davidson coached through the 1937 season, and his record of 35 wins, 11 losses, and 1 tie rank him among the top three Army coaches with Biff Jones and Earl "Red" Blaik. In 1938 Davidson went to Hawaii as a company commander in the 3d Engineer Regiment, and early in World War II he was working for Leslie Groves building the

Pentagon when George Patton selected him to be deputy engineer for Western Task Force in the invasion of North Africa. He was Seventh Army Engineer for the Sicily campaign and served in that capacity to the end of the war. He went to Korea as Assistant Division Commander of the 24th Infantry Division in 1950, and after a two-year tour as Commandant of the Command and General Staff College, he returned to West Point as Superintendent in 1956. He then commanded the Seventh Army in Germany and the First Army in the United States and retired in 1964 as a Lieutenant General.

Army Officer to Army Spouse by Elizabeth Hill

When first asked to write an article about the transition from Army Officer to stay at home Mom I wasn't sure I would know what to write. Yet as I thought about it more, I realized that serving in the Army helped prepare me to be a mom. More than most other jobs, both of these occupations require servant leadership. I also realized that instead of serving the Army as a Soldier, I now have the privilege to serve as a spouse. Although it was hard to leave something I loved so much, now my calling is to raise our children and serve the Army in different ways.

I commissioned through ROTC and was stationed at Fort Riley, KS with my husband, an Engineer. I served for four years at Fort Riley with my last assignment being the Public Affairs Officer and then Current Operations Officer at the 1st Engineer Battalion. I deployed to Iraq with the 1st Engineer Battalion from 2009-2010 as well. I loved my time in the Army. I was proud to put on the uniform every day and I sincerely believed that I was making a difference in the world. My fellow Soldiers made my time in the Army enjoyable and rewarding. Three fellow female officers and I have a unique bond strengthened by supporting each other through the good days and the hard times of a deployment. After fulfilling my four year commitment I decided to resign my commission in order to have children and stay at home with them. Our son, Colin, was born on July 15th -just two months after my final day in the Army.

First, although I am still very new to motherhood, I am reminded everyday of the ways in which the Army and being a mom both require servant leadership. Effective leaders and mothers seek the good of their Soldiers and children above their own. They ensure that everyone is fed before they eat. They sacrifice their own needs and comforts for the good of those in their charge. They continually work longer hours without seeking acclaim, recognition, or thanks. They don't complain about their duties; they joyfully fulfill their roles without complaint. Both callings have tremendous weight and importance: lives are in the balance. When I am tired from nighttime feedings and diaper changes I remember the long hours I worked in the Army and pushing through the fatigue. The Army helped prepare me to be a mother.

Second, in many aspects I have not left the Army. As an Army spouse I serve in different, but just as important, facets. While deployed I realized even more how important support systems are to Soldiers. Soldiers would check the mail every day waiting for the letters and care packages from their spouses, parents or friends. The smallest things were big deals: getting homemade brownies or my favorite face wash made my day. Letters of support from my family reminded me of their love. I want to support my husband's career and make sure that my children know that Daddy doesn't just work to support our family but he protects us and our country. Having deployed before I can better understand what my husband is going through when he has to deploy in the future. I can serve the Army by supporting him and other Soldiers.

I look forward to growing in my new role as a mother. I hope to instill in my children the same values that I learned in the Army. Although at times I miss my life in the Army, seeing Colin smile makes it all worth it. I love it and wouldn't trade him for any career in the world. For now my job is to pour myself into the lives of the next generation of Americans. And, who knows, maybe a future Army Engineer.



ARMY ENGINEER SPOUSES' CLUB Army Engineer Memorial Awards Geraldine K. Morris Award


The Army Engineer Spouses' Club announces the Army Engineer Memorial Awards and the Geraldine K. Morris Award for 2012. The AEMA award is available to qualifying high school seniors who plan to continue their education at an accredited college, university, technical school, or vocational school. The Geraldine K. Morris Award is available to a graduating high school senior who intends to enroll in a program leading to a nursing degree or certification. Applicants may apply for both of the awards, if qualified, but can only be awarded one of the scholarships.

The AEMA award was established in 1973 as a living memorial to Army Engineer Officers killed in Vietnam and is given annually to honor all Engineers who died in the line of duty. This award is open to students in all fields of study.

The Geraldine K. Morris Award was established in 2006 to honor the service and memory of Mrs. Morris, a former Army nurse and Army wife. The awardee must be enrolled in a program leading to a nursing degree or nursing certification. The Geraldine K. Morris Award is renewable annually, based on GPA, provided a student maintains full-time enrollment in a nursing program.

Both awards are based on academic and extracurricular achievement during high school, along with a written essay. Awards must be applied toward tuition or scholastic expenses at a two-year or fouryear college or university, technical school or vocational school. Applications must postmarked by February 29, 2012.
